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Five Hour CEU Conference Friday, December 6th

Renewal time for private pesticide applicators will be coming up shortly on February 28, 2014. As a reminder to anyone with a license, private applicators need 15 Continuing Education Units in order to re-certify. Two hours must be in Laws and Regulations and two hours must be in Integrated Pest Management, with the others coming in the General Category.

Anyone needing hours should mark **Friday, December 6**th on their calendar. On this day, the Beef and Forage Committee of Austin County, the Austin County Farm Bureau and the Sealy FFA Chapter will be co-sponsoring a 5 hour CEU course at Four County Auction Center in Industry. Registration will take place at 12:00 p.m., with the program following about 1:00 p.m.

The program topics will include Pesticide Laws and Regulations, Water Impairments and Runoff Avoidance Issues, IPM for Pasture Pests, Weed Control in Stock Ponds and the new products for controlling brush. There will be no meal served as in years past, however refreshments will be served following the meeting compliments of Mike Hopkins Distributing. We hope to conclude around 6:30 p.m. The registration fee is \$20.00 at the door. You can pre-register by contacting the Extension Office or Sealy FFA Department by December 5th. Credits to be given at the course include 1 hour of Laws and Regulations, 3 hours of General Credit and 1 hour of Integrated Pest Management (IPM).

Leadership Advisory Board to Host Annual Meeting

The Leadership Advisory Board of Austin County was formed six years ago for the purpose of promoting Extension work in the community and strengthening the programmatic efforts of the agents in Austin County. Crops Update Meeting

Row crop farmers, please mark Thursday, January 23rd, on your calendars for the crop update meeting in Wallis. The meeting will take place at the Brazos FFA building in Wallis from 6:00 - 8:30 p.m. Dr. Roy Parker, Extension Entomologist will be on hand to discuss the results of his latest applied research on army worm control for pastures and cotton, corn and grain sorghum pest applied research and demonstrations in the upper Texas Gulf Coast. Dr. Levi Russell will discuss the market outlook and will also give a farm bill update. Two (2) CEU's will be given to all pesticide applicators. There will be no charge for supper, however goodwill donations will be accepted.

Extension Entomologist, Dr. Roy Parker Retires

Dr. Roy D. Parker, Entomologist with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service officially retired August 31, 2013. Roy served as the District 11 Entomologist since 1978, and worked for the Texas A&M University System for more than 40 years. During his tenure, he worked with county agents, ag producers and industry professionals on numerous applied research studies and result demonstrations in cotton, corn, grain sorghum, soy beans, forage crops and livestock just to name a few. He is a noted author, compiling over 100 research journal articles on pest management and each year put together a collection of applied research reports that he gave out at ag producer meetings. Roy was a past winner of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Specialist of the Year Award, a former Superior Service Award Winner for Specialist with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas A&M Vice Chancellors Award Winner. Even though he officially retired on August 31st, he continues to work everyday at the District 11 Office finishing up his research work from 2013. Private Applicator Training and Testing December 18th

There are some big changes coming from the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) with regards to Private Applicator Training and Testing. Beginning January 1, 2014, the TDA will no longer do testing at County Extension Offices. The testing will be located instead at regional testing centers located across the state. The training remains a mandatory component for anyone wanting to receive their Private Applicator license, and will continue to be conducted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. The final opportunity for anyone wanting to receive the training and take their exam at one location will take place on Wednesday, December 18, 2013.

If you are planning on using a state limited use or state restricted use pesticide, such as Grazon P+D, 2 4-D, Weedmaster, etc... and need a license, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service of Austin County will be sponsoring a Private Applicator Training and Testing on Wednesday, December 18th, at the Extension Office, located at 20 S. Holland in Bellville. The training will last from 8:30 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. A representative from the Texas Department of Agriculture will be on hand to administer the 100 question exam following the training. If you complete the training portion and then score a 70 or above on your examination, you will be eligible to apply for your Private Applicator License, which will allow you to purchase all state limited use and restricted use pesticides used in agriculture.

There is a \$50.00 fee to attend the training. Your registration fee includes the study materials, lunch and refreshments. Once you have completed the training and passed the exam, you will be able to apply for your private applicators license. The license fee is \$60.00 and is valid for five years. You are strongly encouraged to pick up your materials early and read through them prior to coming to the training. Please bring something to write with and a calculator to the training. much more. Upon completion of their training, Master Gardeners will be required to give at least 50 hours of volunteer service time in their local community in order to receive the title of *"Master"*

Gardener".

Multi County New Landowners Program starts in January 2014

Multi-County New Landowner Education program is a series of nine informational meetings/seminars/field days designed to make new landowners in Austin Colorado, Fayette & Washington Counties aware of what types of agricultural enterprises are best for their property. Participants in the program will hear from experts in certain fields of agriculture about the best management practices that they can implement on their own property. This innovative program assists new landowners in understanding the concepts of



rural living. Participants in the program are given exposure to ideas on raising livestock and horses, plant identification, fence building, applying pesticides, soil testing, stock pond management, pond construction, fruit and nut production, and much more. The program also serves as a way for new residents of the four counties to network and meet new people in their communities, find out what can be done on their land, what operations can be profitable, and possibly what opportunities they have to serve the community.

The program will be held on the third Friday of the months of January, February, March, April, May,

August, September, October and November. Each month's meeting will be held at different locations in each county. The meetings begin at 1:30 p.m., and last about 4 hours. The first meeting for the 2014 series will take place on Friday, January 17th, at Braeden Hall in Columbus. Cost is \$100.00 per person or \$150.00 per couple for all nine meetings or \$20.00 per person per individual meeting. CEU's for Pesticide Applicators will be given at each meeting, and refreshments will be served at each program session. Participants will receive a notebook full of timely and useful information. The Greatest Generation

A few nights ago, I had the privilege of attending a birthday party for my wife's grandfather. He turned 90 years young, back in August, and although we had already had one party for him with his Sunday School Class, it seemed that a second one would be appropriate, because after all how many times do you turn 90? This time, the party was limited to family and a few close friends that showed up to enjoy each other's company, some good food and to wish him a happy birthday.

When I was kid, the men of this generation were my idols. Of course, they were all my grandfather's age and what little boy doesn't idolize his grandpa. These were the guys who came out of the Great Depression, grew up and saved the world from Hitler's Nazi Germany. They beat back the tide of the Japanese after they had bombed Pearl Harbor. They faced great odds and got off to a late start, but they succeeded on every front and won "the War". They came home to joyous and short-lived celebrations and immediately began the task of rebuilding their lives and the world they wanted. They married in record numbers and gave birth to another distinctive generation, the Baby Boomers. A grateful nation made it possible for more of them to attend college than any society had ever educated. They gave the world new science, agriculture, industry, and economic strength unparalleled in history.

The former NBC nightly news man, Tom Brokaw came out with a book a few years ago chronicling the exploits of this group. He entitled his book, "The Greatest Generation". In it, he examined the lives of many famous people from that era, most notably former President George H. W. Bush. It was a fitting title to describe the people of that age, their struggles and accomplishments before, during and after the war, and how much has changed since those days. If I could go back in time, I would like to have a conversation with my own grandfather about his experiences, but unfortunately for me, I can't because he passed away 15 years ago. I do know that he was stationed in England and later in France as the war progressed. He never talked much about what happened other than an occasional reference here or there, but I do recall one conversation that he and I had just before he passed away. I was at his house and looked at an old photo of him and my grandmother on his dresser, taken just before he shipped out in 1942. He looked very dapper in his brown captain's hat and brown blazer with his khaki shirt and tie (much like the Texas A&M Corp of Cadets wear today). I mentioned something about the photo and I stated "there will never be another war like that one." to which he replied, "I sure hope not." His reaction surprised me. I guess I wanted him to wax nostalgically about that time of his life and tell me some old war stories, but with his short and simple answer I knew that he didn't regard that era as special or romantic, but rather something that just happened along the way.

As "The Greatest Generation" now reaches the twilight of their adventurous and productive lives, they remain just like my grandfather, exceptionally modest. They have so many stories to tell, stories that in many cases they have never told before, because in a deep sense they didn't think that what they were doing was that special, because everyone else was doing it too. They believed themselves to be ordinary people caught up in an extraordinary time.
