Mill Creek Watershed Partnership Meeting

A Mill Creek Watershed Partnership Meeting will be held Thursday, December 8th at the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Office (800 E Wendt St.) in Bellville, TX. The meeting is free to attend and open to the public. Refreshments/light dinner will be served. The agenda will feature an informational lecture on the purpose, application, and potential value of bacterial source tracking to the Mill Creek Watershed. Also on the agenda for the meeting are updates on the watershed partnership project and a discussion on the formation of a volunteer program area committee to facilitate and support ancillary activities of the partnership. If you live within the Mill Creek Watershed please attend to learn more about the watershed and the bacterial source tracking that is being conducted. A map of the Mill Creek Watershed is located on page 9 of the newsletter.

The 2022 Texas Integrated Report for Clean Water Act listed 322 stream segments as impaired due to contamination with bacteria. Mill Creek is on this list of impaired streams. Bacterial source tracking (BST) is a tool that can evaluate the source of the bacteria in streams, be it from cattle/livestock, wild bird species, pet dogs, wild mammal species, etc. How it works, what its potential limitations are, how it might benefit the Mill Creek Partnership, and how the Partnership can pursue funding for BST in Mill Creek will all be part of the informational lecture and discussion for the evening.

Wildlife Service Phone Number

Message from Mike Bodenchuk, Director of Texas A&M AgriLife Wildlife Services

For several years, USDA has maintained a nationwide toll-free number for the public to call for human-wildlife conflicts. The number actually rings in the State Office which is represented by the callers area code. That is, if your area code is a Texas area code, then it will ring in our State Office in San Antonio. This works fairly well, but people moving between states and keeping their home-state cell number has complicated this a bit. Nonetheless, we really haven't made much use of this technology and I'd like to reinvigorate the process to better serve Texans with wildlife conflicts. **The phone number is 866-4 USDA WS (866-487-3297).**

Recently, we changed the routing for that number so it will ring to a government cell phone and hired a technician with experience in providing technical assistance for resolving wildlife conflicts. We intend to use this service as a one-stop for helping people prevent and resolve the common wildlife conflicts. Of course, our existing landowner customers will continue to call their trappers. But for people looking for information on resolving meso-mammal or vulture conflicts, as well as those requiring assistance with MBTA permitting, this number will be a useful quick connection to the Texas Wildlife Service Program.

5 Hour CEU Conference

As a reminder to anyone with a TDA Private Applicator License, you need 15 Continuing Education Units (CEU) in order to re-certify every 5 years, 2 hours in Laws & Regulations and 2 hours in Integrated Pest Management, with 11 hours in the General Category. All TDA Commercial and Non-Commercial Applicator License holders need 5 CEUs every year to re-certify with 1 hour in Laws & Regulations, 1 hour in Integrated Pest Management, and 3 hours in the General Category.

Anyone needing hours should mark Friday, December 9, 2022, on their calendar. The Beef & Forage Committee of Austin County will be hosting a 5 Hour CEU Conference at Four County Auction Center located at 15900 TX-159 in Industry. Registration will take place at 12:30 p.m., with the program starting at 1:00 p.m. The registration fee is \$50.00. We encourage you to pre-register for the program, but walk-ins are welcome. Please call the Austin County Extension Office at 979-865-2072 or visit online at https://austin.agrilife.org/event-registrations/. Refreshments will be served during the conference as well as a meal at the conclusion of the program.

The Program topics will include Picolinic Acid Chemistry Training (PACT) from Dr. Megan Clayton, Pesticide Laws and Regulations Update from Gregory Baker, Improving Herbicide Application from Dr. Mark Matocha, Management of Pastures During & Following Drought from Dr. Larry Redmon, and Gopher & Mole Control Methods from B.R. Koehler and Joe Jimenez. There will be 5 CEU hours awarded, TDA approval for 2 L&R, 1 IPM, and 2 General units.

Renewal update for 2022 Applicator License holders

In response to the ongoing Covid 19 pandemic, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is extending the exemption of agriculture Continuing Education Unit (CEU) requirements. To address the CEU's and licensure requirements for Ag Pesticide applicators, the TDA will work with the ag pesticide applicators and CEU course providers of Texas during this critical time. Licensed applicators with expiring licenses or needing CEU's will be allowed to renew their license even if they have not met their CEU requirement for their current licensing period through December 31, 2022. Due to the uncertainty of the length and severity of the Covid 19 pandemic, many CEU events have been canceled. The TDA will work to insure all the state's pesticide applicators are able to acquire their licenses and required continuing education courses in a safe and effective manner during this time frame. Once CEU courses resume as normal, applicators will be required to obtain their required CEUs for their respective license classification for each licensing period. By allowing a CEU exemption, the applicators maintain their ability to perform pesticide applications for pests, weeds, insects etc., without disrupting daily business functions. Applicators are encouraged to complete online courses even if online courses were completed the previous licensing period.

COMMERCIAL, NON-COMMERCIAL AND NON-COMMERCIAL POLITICAL APPLICATORS For licenses expiring in 2022 ONLY: TDA will exempt commercial, non-commercial and non-commercial political applicators who have taken online or correspondence courses within the last year. The TDA Rule 7.24 (t) (2) does not allow for online or correspondence courses to be taken 2 years consecutively. However, in light of the unusual circumstances due to Covid 19 (coronavirus), the TDA will allow online or correspondence courses to be taken in consecutive years. This exemption will be for the current 2022 licensing period. Commercial, non-commercial and non-commercial political pesticide applicators are required to obtain 5 CEUs per licensing period.

PRIVATE APPLICATORS For licenses expiring in 2022 ONLY: The TDA will also exempt private applicators from the TDA Rule 7.24 (v) (5). This rule does not allow a private applicator to acquire more than 10 CEUs through correspondence courses. During this quarantine time frame, private applicators will be allowed to acquire ALL of their CEUs through correspondence courses (online). Private applicators are required to obtain 15 CEUs per 5- year licensing period.

AUSTIN COUNTY HOG BOUNTY

Austin County Commissioners Court is offering a bounty on feral hogs. Participants will be awarded \$5 per feral hog harvested in Austin County, with biological evidence provided of harvest in the form of a pair of feral hog ears. Each pair must be placed in an individually sealed bag and dropped off at 1 of the 3 drop off locations. Three local feed stores in the county- Steinhauser's in Sealy, Linseisen's Feed & Supply in Bellville, and Lindemann Store in Industry, will serve as the drop off locations.

A limit of 20 pairs per household per month is allowed. All feral hogs must be harvested in Austin County & signed paperwork must be filled out completely to collect money.

New Bluebonnet Master Gardener Project

Over the past couple of months, we have been working on clearing the shrubs which were in front of the County Annex building on Wendt St. A full cement sidewalk was added and planter boxes have been placed along the sidewalk. The larger planter boxes and urns have Texas SuperStar plants, currently being labeled. These Texas SuperStars are plants that can tolerate our Texas weather, and are easy to propagate and easy to care for. These are some great examples of plants you could plant for your own landscaping. The small planter boxes will be for our Austin County 4-Hers to use as practice for Miniscapes. Next time you stop by Bellville, make a trip by the office to see the wonderful plants and happy pollinators that have come by.





The purpose of this training is to obtain a Private Applicator License from Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). This license will enable the applicator to purchase and apply state limited use and federally restricted chemicals on his land or land he has control of for the purpose of production of agricultural commodities. All farm and ranch operators who do not have a Private Applicator's License to purchase "restricted use" pesticides (such as 2, 4-D, Grazon P+D, Tordon 22K, etc.) will need to attend this training.
